PROGRAM: Mike introduced Randy Derryberry who spoke about his 43 years in the railroad business. In 1971, Philip Anschutz bought the Southern Pacific RR and linked it to the Rio Grand RR so he controlled railroad traffic from the west coast to Denver and beyond. Union Pacific RR eventually bought out Southern Pacific RR. Only 4 major railroads remain in the US: BNSF, UP, Norfolk/Southern and CSX.

A number of things have changed over time. There are now as few as 2 crew members per train, where there used to be 5. Technology changes include former 3000 hp engines are now 4400 hp. Aluminum has replaced steel cars. A 105 car coal train carries ~15,000 tons. GM and GE make engines at \$1.1 million each but with the cheapest seats! AC engines can be run in reverse to hold a train in place, and can go up a 2% grade at 1 mph. A computer sets the speed the train will move to accept coal loads at ~3 to 4 tenths mph.

Some interesting facts: The bridge between the River and Austin is being replaced because a derailed car hit it.

UP buys most of its steel for the rails from Japan because it is harder than US steel. State, federal law and company rules require the train's whistle to blow at all public crossings. The whistle blows two long, a short and a long at <45 mph that must last 15 - 20 seconds. It must start 15 seconds before the crossing and continuously blow through the crossing and end at 20 seconds. This is recorded on the train's computer. In fact, everything the engineer does is recorded on the computer.

Trains hit cars all the time, because people try to beat the train. They never win. It takes 1 mile to stop a 16,000 train going 50 mph.
