PROGRAM: [It seems I did not miss the eclipse program, as the scheduled April 27 program occurred on April 20 when I was out of town. - ED] Randy Campbell introduced Art Trevena, a geologist in love with astronomy. Trevena is a member of the Black Canyon Astronomical Society, who spoke about the upcoming solar eclipse. He reported that it has been 38 years since the last total solar eclipse affected the US. On 8/21/17 the path of totality will travel from northwestern Oregon to South Carolina. The closest sightings to us will be in Idaho, Wyoming and Nebraska. For example, Casper, WY will be in the center of the 72 mile wide total eclipse path. Millions of people will be traveling to see this celestial phenomenon.

The cause of an eclipse: the moon passes in front of the sun. As for safely viewing a solar eclipse, use a pin hole projection, eclipse glasses or solar filters on binoculars or a telescope. The eclipse takes about an hour and a quarter from beginning to totality, and lasts up to 4 minutes before starting back to full sunlight. This timing translates to the eclipse moving across the sky at 2300 miles/hour. Here in the north fork the eclipse will begin at 10:19 am and reach 89% at 1:10 pm.

Once the sun is 95% covered, the sky darkens to middle twilight, the air temperature drops, one can see stars and planets, and one can see the sun's corona, which is gases escaping from the sun,
