PROGRAM: Randy introduced Laura Lee Yates, a Paonia librarian and author of <u>Bound for the Western Sea</u>, the canine narration of the Lewis and Clark expedition. While the book is based on fact, and Seaman, a New Foundland, was a real dog, who belonged to Lewis, the work is one of fiction. Yates thinks Seaman was a therapy dog for Lewis, who suffered from depression.

Yates started writing as a child, then became more serious about it in her 30's. She doesn't have trouble starting to write, she said, just stopping. The first people she met in Paonia were Ed and Betsy Marston, of <u>High Country News</u>. She subsequently wrote a book about the Willamette Valley in Oregon and another about Ft. Ross, CA, the southern most Russian settlement in the US. She found herself more involved in writing than publishing, so her writing did not enjoy a wide readership. However, she was sent to Russia as a kind of ambassador, where she visited a small town that some of the Ft. Ross ancestors came from.

For many years she worked in veterinary clinics, and always owned large breed dogs. Now she

owns a dog that is half New Foundland. Along the way she married Harry Harpoon, and eventually became a librarian, probably because she is a voracious reader. She hoped to have her book published by the Lewis and Clark centennial. When that did not happen, she decided to self publish under the title Undaunted Press.

After the Rocky Mountain National Rendezvous, a gathering of folks celebrating the ways of folks who lived before 1843 (one may not wear clothing manufactured after 1843, not even underwear - there will be inspections), Laura Lee and Harry will follow the Lewis and Clark trail to Ft. Clatsop, OR, where the 19<sup>th</sup> century expedition spent a winter. Dressed in period costume, they will visit Great Falls, Bozeman, Boise, and other stops to read from Laura Lee's book and hear music from Harry's CD, which he produced to accompany the book. Once they reach Ft. Clatsop, they hope to be part of the National Park Service's centennial celebration there.

To end her program, Yates read a passage from her book about Lewis' encounter with a grizzly bear. Her book and Harry's CD with a number of original tunes are now for sale.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL: [The Rotary theme for July is Changeover. The official "handing over of the gavel" occurs during the International Convention.] United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon was among the first to welcome Rotary members and friends to the 107th Rotary Convention, heralded as one of the largest-ever gatherings of Rotarians and the most multicultural assembly of nonprofit leaders in Korea.

He offered a message of gratitude: "Rotarians do remarkable work around the world," Ban told the thousands of attendees gathered at KINTEX, the Korea International Exhibition and Convention Center in Goyang city, on the outskirts of Seoul. "You help the United Nations reach our goals, and you help the world understand the United Nations."

He described Allan Albert, the former Rotary president who, 70 years ago this month, participated in discussions that led to the formation of the UN, as "a passionate defender of human understanding who called for people to be real factors in real peace. Together we are working to realize this vision."
