CRAIG CHILDS was our story teller. He is an acclaimed author and lives near Crawford. He is a traveler and author living in sometimes a scary life. He has just been walking across the White Sands, New Mexico for the The following is a very small part of what I found on the internet about Craig.

Criag Childs writes about the relationship between humans, animals, landscape, and time. His stories come from visceral, personal experience, whether in the company of illicit artifact dealers or in deep wilderness. He has published more than a dozen critically acclaimed books, and is a commentator for National Public Radio's Morning Edition. His work has appeared in The New York Times, Los Angeles Times, Men's Journal, Outside, and Orion. At High Country News, he's a contributing editor, and he teaches writing for both University of Alaska in rage and Southern New Hampshire University.

The dunes remind him of the Arctic.
He is writing a book about evidence of ancient man and animals.
He has traveled in remote areas, like on missle ranges where few other



people go. Local photographer, Jordan Schevene recorded his trip. He found mammouth tracks from about 20,000 years ago. Other tracks might have been saber tooth tiger or dire wolf.

He reported that in NM the wind blew all the time, carrying fine gypsum sand into everything and he proceeded to pour some of it out of his boots in this meeting.

This type of wilderness experience is very elemental and pure. It is what he craves.

He used to climb a lot, but that changed when he had children. A handhold lets loose, and you die. In a sandy wilderness you have several days to figure it out before you die.

Another trip to the sand dune sea in SW New Mexico was a 3 week challenge. Nothing but sand in every direction. They walked barefoot at night, but had to be wary of rattle-snakes. With nothing to look at, one hallucinates a lot. Using their peripheral vision they saw many more shooting stars than usual. The dune land-scape reduces vision to the elemental and allows us to see stars in the day-time.

The most remote place in the world he has been to is the Greenland Ice Sheet.

He travels about 1 1/2 years gathering information, before writing

a book. The next trip will be to the Boundary Waters in Minnesota on a dog sled to look at a 12,000 year old site. Next, will be spear hunting wild boars in Oklahoma.
