PROGRAM: Colorado Farm and Food Alliance: Cultivating Climate and Conservation Action from Farm to Table

Sarah introduced Pete Kolbenschlag, who has been a leader in conservation and environment.

Mr. Kolbenschlag said he has worked with a number of non-profit groups and NGO's for over 20 years on a number of issues around conservation and climate change locally as well as nationally. He is now Director of the Colorado Farm and Food Alliance (http://www.coloradofarmfood.org/) which he helped found about four years ago.

The idea of the Colorado Farm and Food Alliance is to local agricultural producers with opportunities to enhance and strengthen local food networks and local food security by promoting markets. They also work to tie that movement in with opportunities to work toward sustainable communities and to take action around conservation and climate change.

The main topic of focus of todays presentation was the Rural Prosperity Project with the goal of understanding what creates prosperity for the rural community.

Their work is done through a set of activities including leadership development as well as working collaboratively with other organizations.

They work to understand what rural prosperity means to the various stakeholders and to identify how to enhance and support rural prosperity. Economic shifts and transformations are taking place at a rapid rate. Communities need to prepare and adapt to these rapid changes and align their economic activity in order to prosper through these transitions. Inhibitors to rural prosperity include such factors as scarcity, lack of capital, absentee ownership and extractive economies. These can be countered by focusing on abundance to identify local resources, circulating more money locally and developing business models that look more toward ecological services a rural area can provide as well as building out local markets and expanding local work opportunities.
