PROGRAM: Princess Beef Cynthia Houseweart

President Bliss introduced Ms. Houseweart, owner of Princess Beef.

Ms. Houseweart explained that Princess Beef is in the business of selling organic, grass-finished beef directly to customers in the valley. She started the business in 1999 with one steer. This year she sold 53 animals to over 150 people.

She said she graduated from Colorado College in 1993 with a degree in art history. A fellow art student's family had a 2000-acre ranch on Fruitland Mesa and arranged a two-day cattle drive as a post-graduation adventure. Ms. Houseweart said she really loved the family and became their ranch hand for the next 13 years. They were unconventional ranchers and studied wholistic management and other environmentally friendly techniques, such as grass-finishing and rotational grazing.

She holds certifications in animal welfare and grass finishing. The cattle are no longer branded. All grazing is done on private land. Low-stress stock handling techniques are used and the animals are kept calm.

Calving is done in March and April as opposed to January, which is more common. The animals are a little smaller and do not require assistance during birth. Across-the-fence weaning is utilized to minimize stress on the calves and their mothers. Weaning is done at 8-months as opposed to the more common 6-months. Inoculations are not required since the cattle live in a healthy environment and are not sent to a feed lot. Any animals that require antibiotics for treatment of disease are not sold as Princess Beef.

Feeding is done with hay that came from the field being used so as to return nutrients to the soil. Additional hay from nearby ranches is also used.

Eating Princess Beef is analogous to eating a home-grown tomato versus a store-bought tomato. The beef is dry-aged for a minimum of two weeks which enhances the flavor. While most of the beef is sold as large portions (quarter, half and whole), smaller packages of ground beef are available at the ranch and at Farm Runners. The entire animal is ground in these cases.
